## Why We Sing the Psalms

- The Psalms are the Word of God, breathed out by the Holy Spirit (2 Timothy 3.16-17).
- The Psalms prophetically speak of Christ, his life and his work (for example, Psalms 2, 8, 16, 22, 24, 34, 35, 38, 40, 41, 45, 47, 68, 69, 89, 102, 109, 110, 118; Luke 20.42; 24.44).
- The Psalms are **quoted in the New Testament** more than any other Old Testament book.
- Jesus sang the Psalms (Matthew 26.30; from the Hallel portion of the Psalter, Psalms 113-118).
- The Apostles tell us to sing the Psalms, in their various named forms (1 Corinthians 14.15, 26; Ephesians 5.19; Colossians 3.16; James 5.13).
- The Psalms are the words of Christ and Spirit filling (Colossians 3.16).
- The Psalms are profitable for teaching, admonishing, and giving thanks to God (Colossians 3.16; 2 Timothy 3.16-17).
- Singing the Psalms is pure praise-worship, in Spirit and truth, that pleases God (John 4.23-24; Hebrews 12.28; 13.15).
- The New Testament Church sang the Psalms exclusively as praise-worship, for the first few centuries.
- The Psalms provide and teach the comprehensive and balanced truth about God that he wants us to know—about his nature, attributes, character, and providences.
- Singing Psalms helps us to memorize God's Word (Psalm 119.11).
- The Psalms have a global, missional perspective (for example, Psalms 18.49; 66.1-4; 67.1-7; 72.19; 87.4-7; 96; 98; 100; 148.11-14) and contain the message of judgement and salvation that the world needs to hear.
- The Psalter "contains even the emotions of each soul". (Athanasius) The Psalms bless and counsel us with messages of salvation, comfort, direction, and encouragement for any situation in life.
- Using the Psalms as praise-worship unifies the world-wide Church around God's Word.
- Everything that we need for the praise-worship of God is in the Psalter—the songbook of the Church.
